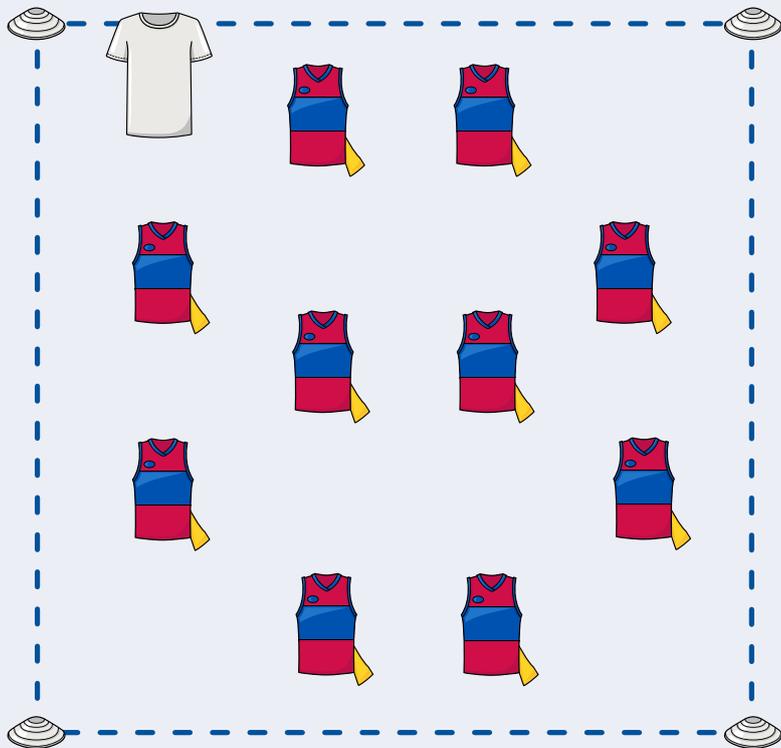


TAGS AND TAILS



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HOW TO PLAY

- 1 On “Go!” Auskickers steal as many tails as they can from others adding stolen tails to the back of their clothing (chasing) and keep their own tail safe (by dodging). Make sure no one tries to tackle another player while trying to steal their tail.
- 2 Once an Auskicker has two tails, they give their next tail to someone without a tail, to help them learn about teamwork.
- 3 The game ends when everyone has swapped tails a few times.
- 4 Ask if anyone managed to keep their tail! Then start again!

EQUIPMENT

1 bib (or ribbon, sashes, etc) per Auskicker and 1 adult per group.



SET-UP

Auskickers spread out, wearing bibs as tails.

CHANGE IT UP

Try changing it up to “Rucks and Rovers”:

Auskickers form two lines facing the coach. One line is “rucks” and the other is “rovers”.

Call out either “rucks” or “rovers”. Whoever gets called sprints to the edge of the playing area while the other team chases to steal their tails.

Try pretending to say “rucks” or “rovers” but instead trick with another R word, like “rabbits” or “rock’n’roll”!
